






Then I started the penciling process!








































Purple Mottled Shore Crab

Purple mottled shore crabs can be found in coral reefs or on rocky shores. Some crabs, like purple mottled shore crabs, can survive in the water and on land!




when sand dollars are alive, they are purple, brown, or green. They are covered in little bristles called spines.

Leafy sea dragons are in the same family as sea horses! They use their leafy bodies as camouflage to blend in with seaweed.




Brown jellyfish get their color from the brown algae that lives on them! Jellyfish, coral, and anemones are all related!


Ochre Sea Star

When a creature makes its own light, it is called bioluminescence!



Through the Foxhole is a visual development project for an animated series. For this project, I explored character and creature development, prop and building design, and world-building.

When 4-and-a-half year old Cooper Finley and his Dad, Daniel, move across the country, Cooper discovers a Foxhole that leads to a magical town. When Cooper suddenly turns into a fox, their only hope is to find Lady Salma: the only witch powerful enough to undo his curse. With the help of their new magical friends, Cooper and Daniel embark on a journey across the U.S. to reverse Cooper's curse and save the world of magic.

Target Audience: 7+ Children and Teens Adults that enjoy cartoons

My process began with writing the story and developing the world of Through the Foxhole. I created moodboards and gathered references.












The Beastlands

The first characters I created were Dan and Cooper. In my junior year, I created a concept for a comic about a boy and his dad who could turn into foxes. The story was born from these simple sketches. I refined and refined and refined until I was happy with the final designs.



Making turnarounds helped me visualize my characters in a 3D space










I played around with color and lighting











Long ago, magic beings walked alongside humans. Witches practiced their arts in secret, and built a community that worked to protect themselves and other, more vulnerable magical beings and creatures from being discovered. Everything changed when the witch Gideon Flagg exposed these communities to the world. Magic beings were feared and hated. This fear turned to violence, and the magical communities had to go into hiding. For their protection, the witch, Lady Salma sealed villages of the surviving magic beings away using a series of protection spells called Obistriums. No one goes in- no one goes out. That is, until Cooper Finley.

Single dad, Daniel "Dan" Finley, moves to a small town with his 4-and-a-half year old autistic son, Cooper. While exploring the property around their new home, Cooper discovers a rather large "foxhole" in their yard.

That night, he witnesses a small figure in a cape go through the hole, and he follows suit. What he finds is the town of Ferinwallow, one of the secret communities that had been sealed away all those years ago.

When exposed to magic, Cooper finds himself cursed with the uncontrollable ability to turn into his favorite animal: a fox. Dan and Cooper, with the help of the witches Beatrice Florez and Margo Moore, embark on a roadtrip across the U.S. to find Lady Salma, the only witch powerful enough to undo Cooper's curse and to stop the holes that are opening up in the Obstriums. They discover other hidden villages along the way, and

pick up other magic beings who are also hoping to find Lady Salma.

Through the Foxhole seeks to represent marginalized people through the metaphor of magic and through each character's lived experiences. It works to explore the intersectionality of queer, neurodivergent people.

Dan and Cooper's experience with magic functionally works as a metaphor for autism and finding acceptance within the neurodivergent community. It follows Dan's journey of discovery for both Cooper and himself. Daniel is scared of magic at first, in the same way many parents are scared of their child being autistic. He, at first, is dead set on finding a cure, but slowly discovers that there IS no cure, because there's no curse. There is nothing wrong with Cooper; he has always been magic. Magic is not a superpower or a curse, and it manifests differently in each person. Each character Daniel and Cooper encounter represents a different part of the neurodivergent experience. This story is about community and finding yourself within one.

The communities also exist as a reflection of the LGBTQ+ community, especially those in the 40's-60's who had to stay in hiding. The Obstriums are functionally both a safe haven and a prison, much like how gay bars and businesses were safe for queer people, but also hidden for their safety.







I spent months writing the story, diving into each of the main characters' background, and developing the lore of the world:


Daniel "Dan" Finley

Dan Finley is the 40-year-old dad of Cooper. He decided to move across the country with Cooper to follow his dreams of living in a quiet town and opening a bakery.








Lóng Min

Gideon Flagg Gideon Flagg is the witch credited with exposing magic as a younger man, and is the main antagonist of the story. Gideon is a complicated person. When he was young, he fell in love with a magic user named Lady Salma. She introduced him to an underground organization of magic users called the Foxhole Society. The Foxhole Society worked together to help protect other magic users and to share and record their magical findings.





Gideon's Magic

Gideon, after believing for his whole life that he was broken, finally found his people. When he looked through the old books of magic he found that his mother was a member of The Foxhole Society before she died. When he confronted his father about it, he revealed that she was killed by another magic user, and banned Gideon from using magic and from seeing Lady.

When Gideon's attempted spell to commune with the dead went horribly wrong, he inadvertently exposed his dad to the more dangerous side of magic. His father gathered up the townsfolk and went on a rampage against magic, which eventually forced magic beings into hiding.


After Gideon and Lady were separated by the Obstrium spell, Gideon spent his life trying to find her, using magic to keep himself alive for over one-hundred years. He created a spell that could dig through the Obstriums. He controls the spell using a potion, but the more he uses it, the less control he has. The holes become bigger and bigger, leaving the villages he tears into vulnerable.






Pippin the Stragtid


Pippin is a domestic stragtid, which is a pet not recommended for magic users with no experience in beastkeeping. A stragtid's demeanor is not unlike a housecat.





The Guardian The Guardian is a Cerisskel, which is a creature related to a stragtid. The Guardian had been loyally guarding Lady Salma's house for decades.


